What is the national data opt-out?

"A patient should be able to state their preference once (online or in person), confident in the knowledge that this will be applied across the health and social care system"

National data opt-out setting service

 The service to set a national data opt-out was made available on 25 May 2018 (public beta) providing a secure way for patients to express their preference about the use of their data for purposes beyond their individual care and treatment

- Patients can access the service online e.g. using a smartphone, tablet or personal computer
- A national telephone service is also available to support an assisted digital, on behalf of, and non-digital (paper) service
- Patients have access to information to make an informed choice about whether
 or not to share their data for reasons other than their individual care



Use this service to request that your confidential patient information is not used beyond your own individual care.


If you decide to opt out, this will be respected and applied by NHS Digital and Public Health England. These organisations collect, process and release health and adult social care data on a national basis. Your decision will also be respected and applied by all other organisations that are responsible for health and care information by March 2020.

An opt-out will only apply to the health and care system in England. This does not apply to your health data where you have accessed health or care services outside of England, such as in Scotland and Wales.

Your Data Matters to the NHS

Information about your health and care helps us to improve your individual care, speed up diagnosis, plan your local services and research new treatments.

In May 2018, the strict rules about how this data can and cannot be used were strengthened. The NHS is committed to keeping patient information safe and always being clear about how it is used.

You can choose whether your confidential patient information is used for research and planning.

How your data is used

Your health and care information is used to You can choose to opt out of sharing your improve your individual care. It is also used where to put GP dinics and plan for the number of doctors and nurses in your local used: for example, during an epidemic hospital. Wherever possible we try to use data that does not identify you, but sometimes it is necessary to use your confidential patient information.

What is confidential patient information?

Confidential patient information identifies you and says something about your health. care or treatment. You would expect this information to be kept private. Information care and treatment. You will still be invited that only identifies you, like your name and address, is not considered confidential patient information and may still be used: for example, to contact you if your GP practice is merging with another.

Who can use your confidential patient information for research and planning?

It is used by the NHS, local authorities, university and hospital researchers, medical colleges and pharmaceutical companies researching new treatments.

Making your data opt-out choice

confidential patient information for research to help us research new treatments, decide and planning. There may still be times when your confidential patient information is where there might be a risk to you or to other people's health. You can also still consent to take part in a specific research project.

Will choosing this opt-out affect your care and treatment?

No, your confidential patient information will still be used for your individual care. Choosing to opt out will not affect your for screening services, such as screenings for bowel cancer.

What should you do next?


You do not need to do anything if you are happy about how your confidential patient information is used.

If you do not want your confidential patient information to be used for research and planning, you can choose to opt out securely online or through a telephone service.

You can change your choice at any time.

Information for your patients

Please ensure you:

- Display the 'Your data matters to the NHS' poster, and make handouts available to patients
- Review existing patient materials (posters, leaflet, website) and remove any that are out of date so that patients have the latest information about data uses beyond individual care and the national data opt-out
- Check locally produced materials for accuracy if they refer to opting out, such as registration forms, questionnaires
- Consider using the screen text for electronic displays in reception/waiting areas
- Consider using the recommended standard text about the wider uses of health and care data, alongside or within Privacy Notices

Summary of Operational Policy Guidance

- Covers health and adult social care in England only
- Applies to publicly funded or co-ordinated care
- Type of data Confidential Patient Information
- Purpose and legal basis underpins application of opt-out:
 - Purposes beyond individual care
 - Applies when S251 (reg 2 or 5) is legal basis for the disclosure
- Anyone registered on PDS (ie with data in English system) can opt-out
- Formal proxies can set opt-out on behalf of others eg LPA and parents/guardians
- Young people can set their own opt-out from age 13
- Previous type 2 opt-outs have been migrated to national data opt-outs
- Type 1s continue until 2020 when they will be reviewed

Applying the national data opt-out

Applies to data shared for planning and research purposes

Single option that covers: Research – finding ways to improve treatments and identify causes of and cures for illnesses Planning – to improve and enable the efficient and safe provision of health and care services

This identifies you personally

Data shared for an individual's care and treatment

E.g. where data is shared between the health and care professionals in a hospital and in a GP practice

This identifies you personally

Legal requirement / public interest / consent

E.g. There is a mandatory legal requirement such as a court order, to protect the greater interests of the general public, or there is explicit consent

This identifies you personally

Data is anonymised

The data shared is determined to be compliant with the ICO Anonymisation: managing data protection risk code of practice

This does not identify you personally

When does a national data opt-out NOT apply

- Communicable diseases and risks to public health i.e.
 Regulation 3 Control of Patient Information Regs 2002
- Data flowing to ONS for statistical purposes
- Flows to PHE for National Cancer Registration Service and National Congenital Anomalies and Rare Diseases Registration Services
- Data for provision and oversight of national population screening programmes
- National patient experience surveys, until April 2019 pending a further decision on the way forward for surveys
- 'Assuring Transformation' data flows, until programme closure

Practical considerations

- Responsibility for application is on data controllers (including joint), data processors act under instruction
- Applies to electronic (structured and unstructured) and paper format
- Continues to apply after a person has died
- Whole record must be removed from data being used
- NHS Number (key to record removal)
- Opt-outs are applied at a point in time, not retrospectively
- Records containing information about multiple individuals
- Applies to cross border flows unless otherwise exempt
- Statistical publication available

Payments, Invoice Validation and Risk Stratification

- Payments and invoice validation
 - Will NOT apply to non-contracted invoice validation
 - WILL apply to purposes which rely on s.251 support
- Risk stratification
 - Will NOT apply to data anonymised in line with the ICO code of practice on anonymisation
 - Will NOT apply to risk stratification for case finding, where carried out by a provider involved in an individual's care (or data processor). This is to be treated as individual care for purposes of the opt-out
 - WILL apply to purposes which rely on s.251 support

How it works - upholding




NHS Digital applying national data opt-outs and Public Health England applying from September 2018

All other health & adult social care organisations will be expected to uphold by March 2020

Upholding – how you can get involved

- Working with trusts and GP practices
- Engaging with other organisation types, local data sharing schemes, LHCREs
- Intention is to deliver a working solution during September 2018
- Plan to deploy solution in pilot sites over the Autumn 2018

The upholding solution



Upholding – pilot sites

- Phase 1: analysis of information flows to assess suitability for pilot
- Phase 2: deployment:
 - MESH configuration
 - Local communication
 - Application of upholding solution against each information flow
 - Possible phasing of information flows within pilot timeframe

Working towards the March 2020 deadline

- Start considering your data uses beyond individual care and whether you think any would need to apply opt-outs
- Contact us if you think you will have to, or if you aren't sure and need some further help to understand the policy in line with your own specific data uses
- We can meet with you (1-2-1 or in your local groups) to help with understanding the application of the policy, technical implementation, and to think about any necessary process and business changes to the way you handle data
- If you think you'll need to apply opt-outs start identifying who in your organisation will need to get involved i.e. who will:
 - Determine when opt-outs need to apply in line with the policy
 - Manage the usage/dissemination of data for purposes beyond individual care
 - Understand the technical solution and how to implement into the organisation
 - Lead on the decision as to when the organisation should implement the national data opt-out


